Spoke about Dr. Harrington's presentation: Labor Market and Fiscal Impacts of Educational Attainment in NYC" She shared data points: There is a 65% investment if a student graduates from High School.

There is a 400% investment if a student graduates from College.

Jean spoke about ELO – Expanded Learning Opportunities that are those things that happen after school.

Question:

Joel Ratner, NYS Music Administrators

Spoke about the BEDS forms an Arts Survey that will be completed next week. He suggested it would show a reduction in Arts teachers and Arts programs. He spoke about the result of a Band and Chorus program in a high needs district. He explained that the students involved in the program did remarkably well in their grades more so than the rest of the student population. He explained that sometimes when we look to new programs the programs are already in place.

Stevens: Dr. Steiner and King are interested in the whole child. She looks to have expanded conversations about what it means to be educated.

Response of Commissioner Steiner to CTE initiatives: "Are we properly recognizing and acknowledging our students for the best they can be?"

Powerpoint presented. (CTE) Career and Technical Education, Future Directions Initiatives.

CTE is about all kids. What do you want to do-how is this subject important as to what I want to be?

What motivates you to stay in school? (See Commissioner Steiner's statement)
Now students need to have a goal/direction. Can do this in middle school and high school.
Law said ELA should be reviewed first.
Regents wanted to review (CDOS) Career Development and Occupational Studies second.

Takes innovation and money to accomplish what we want to do. A lot can be done without money.
Researchers did not charge-j they just got their travel paid.

For student centered priorities:

- 1, integration of Academic and Technical Content must be available to all students.
2. Rigorous Technical Studies and Assessments must be recognized as a viable component of graduation requirements.
3. Achievement in CTE should be included in documentation of a student's readiness for college and career.
4. Linkages between learner levels must be a component of student graduation plans.

Obama in Troy said: 40% of future will require associate degree not BA degrees

State Ed is looking at: What are alternative and equivalent knowledge we can recognize
IEP issue:

What can we do to replace the IEP to make it more valuable?

Students need real skills that they can show off.

Need to embed in the academics what the student was going to do after graduation day.

**Approved by State Education Department September 18, 2009
Not formerly a State policy-guidance from NYSCEA and STANYS**

Section 80-3.6(b) (1) of regulations of the commissioner of education requires that professional certificate holders and teaching assistant III certificate holders complete professional development every five years (175 hours for teachers and administrators, and 75 hours for teacher assistant III personnel). Teachers and administrators who participate in:

- Conferences
- Presentations
- Other professional development activities conducted by educational associations or organizations may be eligible to receive credit toward the professional development requirement.....
